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Introduction

Universal Declaration of Human Rights:

Article 26.

□ (1) Everyone has the right to education.

El Constitution – Aims of Education International:

- "to promote the political, social and economic conditions that are required for the realisation of the right to education in all nations"
- Rationale of "crisis" poses this principle at risk:
 - Education is an expense
 - All expenses must be cut

Issue #1: The Right to Education

 Financial crisis establishes an economic dominance over political discussions

- Sacrificing a generation of children to economic crisis does not match the human right for education
 - Minority groups are particularly vulnerable
 - Financial crisis creates 'new losers'

Issue #2: Enrolment in Education


Problems of hidden costs of education leading to lower accessibility:

- Fees
- School books
- Opportunity costs of children/adolescents not working
- Increasing costs of higher education

CEE and Central Asia countries made progress

 However wide disparities remain (UNESCO Global Monitoring Report, 2009)


Figure 2: Changes in primary net enrolment ratios between 1999 and 2006



Issue #3: Investment in Education

- Surveys show different types of cuts:
 - Withdrawal of:
 - Promised investments and pay increases
 - Foreign language courses
 - **...**
 - Reductions of general expenditure
 - Delayed infrastructure investments
 - Cutting benefits such as pensions, childcare etc
- UNESCO Global Monitoring Report 2009 shows:
 - Decline in foreign aid

Cuts/Reductions in Education



Issue #4: Teachers' Salaries

- Survey finds:
 - Delayed payment of salaries (Romania)
 - Promised salary increases not given in full (Poland)
 - Salary freezes (Serbia, Romania)
 - Salary reductions (Lithuania, Bosnia Herzegovina, Czech Republic, Hungary, Latvia)
 - Reduction of salary minimums (Estonia, Croatia)
 - Reduction in non-salary benefits (Estonia, Poland)

Issue #5: Pensions (1)

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TEACHERS' PENSION FUNDS UNDER STRESS

Issue #5: Pensions (2)

- Pension funds have declined: due to loss on stock market
 - □ In OECD countries, pension schemes have lost 23% of their value and will recover slowly because of decline in growth (OECD 2009)
- Problem exacerbated by ageing population and decreasing labour market
- Public pensions have been included in public sector cuts
