Following the positive feedback from the ETUCE member organisations at the last CEE-Roundtable in Kiev in 2011, the ETUCE Secretariat has updated the brochure on project opportunities for CEE countries. This publication intends to guide the member organisations of ETUCE in the Central Eastern European area through some of the funding opportunities within the framework of the European Union, as well as other funds dedicated to this particular area.

As Europe is shaken by economic and financial crises and governments are using the crises to undermine social dialogue systems and austerity measures as an excuse to implement budget cuts in education, the European social model seems to be under attack. At the same time, the European Union is committed to creating more and better jobs and a socially inclusive society. These goals are at the core of the Europe 2020 strategy for generating smart, sustainable and inclusive growth in the EU. The various funding opportunities of the EU and other organisations play an important role in meeting Europe's goals, and in mitigating the consequences of the economic crisis — especially the rise in unemployment and poverty levels.

There is a great variety in the nature, size and aims of European projects and funding opportunities, and they address a wide variety of target groups. To name only a few, projects can aim at education systems, teachers and students; at access to employment and job retention, young and older job-seekers; language learning, the fight against discrimination, better working conditions and to promote social dialogue. The indicatives aim to inspire enhanced cohesion and further solidarity among the various stakeholders and actors in society, showing that participation at local, regional, national and European level is important.

In accomplishing these targets, education is an important area in which a great effort must be made. The modern school systems are facing the challenge to adapt to the increasing diversity of the student body to deliver high-level education for all. To achieve this, the European Commission recognizes in line with ETUCE's priorities that teachers and other education staff need to receive training.

This brochure is to be understood as a first guide to European funding opportunities for CEE countries and by no means pretends to be comprehensive. It rather wishes to inspire ETUCE member organisations in their search for funding for their manifold projects and actions and to encourage them to make best use of the large variety of European funds available.

	Since the LLP-programmes allows for third-countries only to be involved as partners, this means that ETUCE or a Member Organisation (within EU, EEA-EFTA, Switzerland and candidate countries, Montenegro & Turkey) must submit an application on a call for proposal while involving partners (e.g. Member Organisations in third countries ⁵) in multilateral projects and their implementation.

	* The European Social Fund (ESF), the main financial instrument allowing the Union to realise the strategic objectives of its employment policy;
	* The Cohesion Fund contributes to interventions in the field of the environment and trans-European transport networks. It applies to member states with a Gross National Income (GNI) of less than 90% of the EU average. As such, it covers all 12 new member states as well as Greece and Portugal. Spain is also eligible for the Cohesion Fund, but on a transitional basis (so-called "phasing out")

Roma Education Fund

Roma Education Fund
The Roma Education Fund (REF) was created in the framework of the Decade of Roma Inclusion in 2005. Its mission and ultimate goal is to close the gap in educational outcomes between Roma and non-Roma. In order to achieve this goal, the organization supports policies and programs, which ensure quality education for Roma, including the desegregation of education systems.
Grant applications are accepted from public and private entities in member countries of the Council of Europe. Special attention is focused on the countries which have formally joined the Decade of Roma Inclusion, but applications are considered from other countries, especially countries with a substantial Romani population.
Grants can be made to both the public and the private sectors, as well as to combinations (partnerships) of these. The public sector can include national, regional and local governments. The private sector can include Romani and non -Romani civil society organisations, and private educational establishments and policy institutes. Multi -country grants can also be considered so long as there is one clear organisation taking overall responsibility.
The REF has several programmes of which the following can be of relevance to ETUCE member organisations: Project Support Programme This Programme provides grants for initiatives by governmental and non-governmental agencies in the Decade of Roma Inclusion countries. Applications are also considered from other countries with a substantial Roma population. The REF finances projects at all education levels, i.e. preschool, primary, general and vocational secondary and tertiary, and adult education, and for policy development. Reimbursable Grant Programme This Programme provides support to Roma NGOs in accessing EU Structural Funds and other associated funds. An advance is provided to organisations which have been awarded grants from EU sources, allowing them to start activities before actual financing from the respective government agencies or the EU becomes available. Since 2006, the REF has helped 21 NGOs in three countries, i.e. the Czech Republic, Hungary and Slovakia, to mobilize EUR 2.5 million of EU support with EUR 290,000 REF contribution. The Programme has been set up as a pilot facility available for the EU member states, but will be extended for non-EU members, principally in the Western Balkans. The REF is also lobbying the EU and the respective government agencies managing EU funds for procedures that allow NGOs easier access to these funds.
